

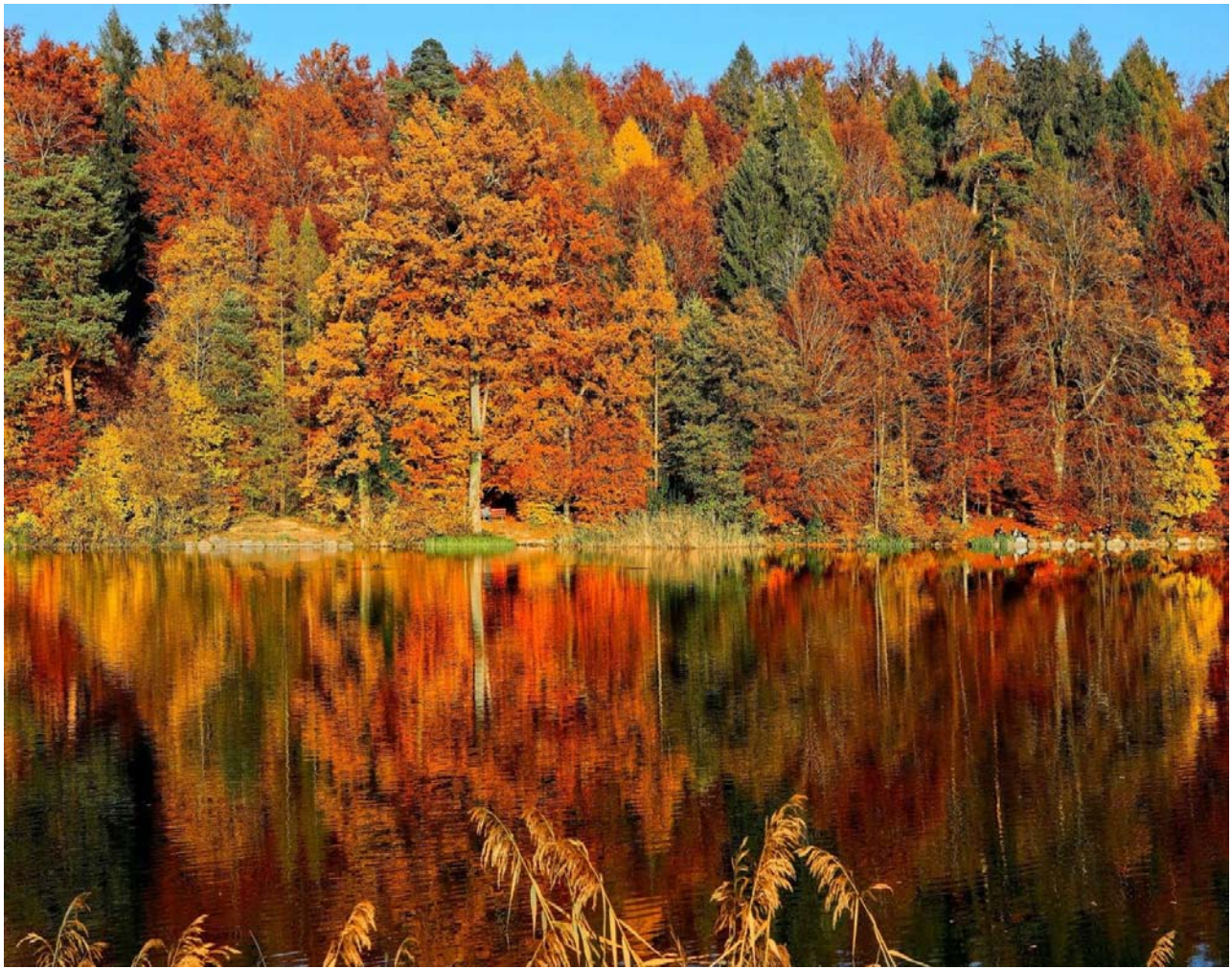

## Coordinator's Message

Hello everyone,

Welcome to our 2<sup>nd</sup> CoSA V/FV newsletter. I would like to say a special thank you to Peter K. for helping us with the interviews and content of this newsletter. I hope you are all settling into a “normal” fall. Before the update itself, I want to thank the staff, board of directors, committee members, and all circle volunteers. Your dedication to CoSA and our core members is tremendous.

I would like to give you a quick overview of CoSA V/FV. Presently we have over 30 circles currently in Vancouver, Surrey, Abbotsford, Chilliwack, and in B.C.’s Interior. We have 70 active volunteers that we are so grateful for; our program is possible because of you.

In June, we held our Annual General Meeting and were pleased to welcome Connor L. and Jim C. to the Board of Directors for CoSA V/FV. We would like to thank Bob Buckham for his exceptional service on the board over the last four years and are grateful for his continued service as Assistant Coordinator of CoSA V/FV.

We are thankful to CSC for a contract from July 1, 2021, to April 30, 2022 to create and operate “circles of support and accountability” for federally supervised sex offenders on conditional or statutory release, and/or on Long Term Supervision Orders in the Pacific Region. We are also pleased to have received Project Advance funds to research and develop virtual circles that I will elaborate on shortly. We appreciate the continued support from the Basilian Human Development fund and look forward to helping more people through their funding.

CoSA V/FV fundraising committee has been reaching out to the broader community. Over the past few months, they have approached volunteers, the CWL and the Knight of Columbus for donations, and the response was wonderful. Since August 2020, we have held five webinars on a number of pertinent community safety topics. We had people from all over the Fraser Valley joining us to learn about how to keep their friends and loved ones safer. Another tool we have been using to engage people outside of CoSA is our website. We are happy to share that the website is completed and is fully functional. We would like to offer a special thanks to Bill K. for all of his work on creating our website and continuing to maintain it.

CoSA V/FV continue to grow and adapt to the needs of our core members, this is evident through the work of the CoSA Visioning committee that started in February of 2021. The Objective of the CoSA Visioning committee is to look towards the future and see how we can improve CoSA V/FV. One of their first tasks has been to look at developing a program for virtual circles for CM's, both those living locally as well as those who, for various reasons, need to connect virtually. The direction of the group is to look into best practices as they relate to virtual circles and produce training/guideline documents to assist them. They sent out a survey to all CM's to help us understand why they joined and why they stay. Virtual circles allow us to accept volunteers and core members outside of our area. We are beginning to recruit volunteers for virtual circles throughout the pacific region and Yukon. Our greatest need continues to be recruiting for in-person circles.

At a national level, I continue to attend Zoom site committee meetings and board meetings with CoSA Canada. I serve on the board as a representative of the western sites and have given voice to their concern about sustainability of the CoSA program after the end of the contract in March 2022. CoSA Canada, in collaboration with the sites across the country, have produced and distributed to sites a CoSA Volunteer Handbook and a CoSA Staff Good Practice Handbook. These will be valuable reference resources.

I hope this gives you a sense of what is happening locally, regionally, and nationally. These are exciting times for CoSA V/FV and we are glad you are on the journey with us. We hope you can join us at the CCJS Volunteer Support and Development Day on October 2, 2021, from 9:30 am – 11:15 am.

Please also save the date for our CoSA VFV banquet at Eagle Quest Golf Course on March 10<sup>th</sup>, I hope to see all the volunteers and supporters there.

## **"Gratitude for his Circle"**

**Interviewed By: Peter K.**

“Jeffrey” (not his real name) was preparing to be released from prison in 2019. This had been his second time through the justice system, and he was only too aware that he needed to stay crime free from here on in and that he could not go it alone. Most of his family members and former friends had been alienated. Who else could he turn to? He nervously removed one of the CoSA pamphlets from the rack, knowing that if noticed by the others, it could serve to identify him as a sex offender. He contacted Maureen, who put a CoSA circle together for him and it has continued right up to the present.

Jeffrey knew that he needed to be challenged and his circle members did just that. He really appreciated that he could openly and honestly share his inner thoughts, temptations, concerns and feelings without anything being reported back to the justice system. He told us that as well as asking difficult questions that need resolution, his circle does some problem solving with him to help rebuild his life.

Finding employment was an enormous challenge. There were some holes in his resume that could not be accounted for at job interviews. He reluctantly accepted a low paid job working in a warehouse at Amazon. Eventually he was able to find a better position, where he could use some of his computer skills. He has been able to do some of his work from home. He likes this but says he actually works harder at the office than from his home.

Before his arrest he had owned his own home, which had to be sold so that he could pay his lawyer’s fees. He hopes to be able to eventually buy his own place again. Another of his long-term goals is to reconnect with some of his family members and to find friends.

Jeffrey realizes that he slipped up last time by violating his condition to avoid alcohol. He does attend A.A. meetings and he told us his “higher power” is his A.A. group. He is not a religious person. He draws strength from other group members to avoid alcohol. He said that in a similar manner he is able to draw strength from his CoSA circle to remain on the right path.

He identified two highlights related to his circle. It felt wonderful to go out with his circle members to a pizza parlour in a social setting and just being able to talk and enjoy being with his CoSA volunteers. The other highlight was when he spoke at one of the CoSA banquets, sharing some details of his life. He felt a sense of accomplishment from speaking to a large group.

As we ended our interview, Jeffrey said that he is very much impressed that people would volunteer their time and effort on CoSA circles to help people in his situation.

### **Summary of CoSA Advanced Training on September 11, 2021**

It has been a while since our volunteer community has gathered together in person, so it felt wonderful to come together again at the advanced training session held at Our Lady of Good Counsel Church in Surrey on September 11.

The format was different this time, with more involvement in small group discussions, and sharing of experiences in the circles. Understandably because of Covid, the attendance was somewhat less than usual but the participation and enthusiasm were better than ever.

Maureen welcomed everyone and provided an update of CoSA news, including mention of the new CoSA website, which may be viewed at:

Instead of using Power Point slides, Connor organized small groups, with each assigned to discuss one of the four sections of an information sheet and then had spokespersons share the group summaries. This format was very well received. It

helped newer volunteers to gain knowledge and perspective from the more experienced volunteers and improved the opportunities for asking questions.

Chris shared about his involvement with Homeboy Industries in Los Angeles. This organization was started by Father Greg Boyle, and it provides support, encouragement, employment opportunities and many other services for offenders, many of who are former gang members. Chris had been inspired by a book entitled "Tattoos on the Heart" written by Father Boyle. Information regarding Homeboy Industries is available at: <https://homeboyindustries.org/>

A moving video entitled "Step Inside the Circle" helped everyone to see life from the perspective of most sexual offenders, who early in life were victimized themselves, being abused physically, mentally, emotionally and/or sexually themselves.

Anita led us through a series of case study situations, using a unique method of audience participation. Each of us was given a green, yellow and orange coloured popsicle stick to simultaneously hold up to indicate whether we felt a specific situation was okay, questionable or unacceptable in a CoSA circle meeting. This introduced an element of fun and yet was a great lead-in to some good discussions about important principles such as always focusing on the core members at our circle meetings and avoiding letting a group become a friendship circle that no longer asks the tough questions. This session received a number of positive comments from participants, including two who said this was the best exercise ever.

Maureen closed our seminar with some last-minute words of advice to be non-judgmental, compassionate, open and respectful and avoid making assumptions.

"A Fresh Start for Alex"

After serving a lengthy sentence, "Alex" (not his real name) was released into a world that was strange to him. Metropolitan Vancouver was immense compared to the small prairie town where he had spent most of his life. Getting around on transit was bewildering to him. Once he had ended up miles away from his intended destination.

Alex broke into a sweat as he anxiously prepared to enter his first CoSA meeting. Even most of his family members didn't want to have him back in their lives again. How would this small group of strangers react when he shared details of the worst part of his past with them? He was actually shaking as he walked into the room.

His P.O. had suggested that CoSA would be helpful for him, but he wasn't able to tell him much about it. He wouldn't have even decided to come if a friend of his who was in a CoSA group had not raved about it. Alex had endured some large group sessions on the inside, where he had learned a few coping skills to reduce his inappropriate sexual urges, but he was always aware that anything he said there could be written in his record and used against him. He once asked to have personal counselling, but he found this was not possible for him unless he was feeling suicidal. He just wanted someone to listen to him.

Alex made it through his story and sat back expecting the circle members would reject him. However, his group accepted him in spite of his past. They showed they cared about him and continued to support him to help him to build a successful life. This amazed him. Now, looking back over recent months since his circle started, Alex's circle members have helped him through the hurdles he has faced since being released. Finding a job was difficult, considering the restrictions that he has. His group helped him to narrow down the places and positions to apply for. Thanks to his CoSA circle, he now has a promising interview coming up, where he can use his past experience to good advantage. The company is aware of his criminal background but are still willing to consider him for the position. His circle has been helping him to prepare and to build up his confidence.

Alex is aware of the dangers such as pornography, sex and alcohol that he needs to beware of and his circle keeps asking him the tough questions that help him to face up to important issues. He contacts individual circle members between meetings, which take place each week. He wishes that he could have had such a wonderful group years ago and he would now probably be in a much better situation. He would eventually like to relocate closer to his hometown, where his mother lives. She has supported him through all of his struggles and Alex appreciates the fact that she says lots of prayers for him, even though he is not a religious person. He has a few real friends nearer to his hometown, including one who is like a brother to him.

On a recent special occasion, Alex's circle took him out to a nice restaurant for an enjoyable meal and some social time together. He loved and appreciated it immensely. One day Alex wrote a text message to Maureen, thanking her for organizing a group that was making such a great difference for him. She responded with a message that meant so much to him he has not deleted it from his phone. It said, "think of this as the first day of a new life for you". That got to him, bringing

encouragement, inner peace and confidence. He really appreciated being told that she had noticed positive changes in him.
